SLEEPING MATS FOR THE HOMELESS

(Demonstration at fellowship time, April 7)

There is always a need. We were able to make over 200 kits for young women in Peru. This time the need is more local – sleeping mats for the homeless made from plastic shopping bags. We have a lot of plastic bags at church. There are three different jobs that need to be done:

1. The bags need to be folded and cut into strips.

2. The strips need to be joined into a continuous piece of plastic for crocheting.

3. The mats need to be crocheted using only a chain stitch and single crochet. You will need a crochet hook, size N, or something close.

Instructions for making the mats can be found on Youtube and many websites. <u>Here is a</u> <u>sample pattern</u>:

1. Flatten the plastic bag and straighten any of the bags creases. Keep folding bag vertically (from left edge to right edge) until the fold is approx. 1 inch wide.

2. Cut off the top handles and the bottom seam. (Put unused scraps in a bag to recycle at grocery store drop-off).

3. From top to bottom of folded bag, cut $1 \frac{1}{2}$ inch strips across vertically (left to right). Each strip should be a loop when opened up. (If any strip has an opened end, tie a very small knot to make it a loop).

4. Hook the loops together with a basic "larks head knot". This is done by overlapping two of the loops end-to-end, then pulling the top of one end through the middle intersection of the two loops. Repeat this step.

5. Roll the looped strips into a ball of "plarn".

6. Using size N crochet hook, or something close, crochet 60 chain stitches (approx. 3 ft wide). Continue to crochet rows of single crochet stitch until the sleeping mat is approximately 6 feet long and 3 feet wide.

7. Crochet a chain stitch of plarn long enough to attach to one end and tie up the rolled mat. This serves as a carrying handle.

FOR YOUR CONSIDERATION:

If you have not had the opportunity to worship with us on Sundays since Ash Wednesday, we have been discussing the word "Salvation." I've been suggesting a different way of thinking about salvation as more than what happens when you die. This basic idea came from the writings of Marcus Borg.

Many people grew up in the churches that had a common framework of "heaven and hell" Christianity. Salvation as "going to heaven" affected their understanding of its sibling terms <u>saved</u> and <u>savior</u>. Because the obstacle to going to heaven was <u>sin</u>, to be <u>saved</u> meant being <u>saved from their sin</u>. <u>Savior</u> referred to Jesus dying for their sins in order to make their salvation possible. Many thought that was what church and religion were all about. Going to heaven?

Even as children they worried about whether they had believed in Jesus enough and behaved as they needed to in order to be saved. Salvation was laden with anxiety, incorporated as it was within a <u>fear-based Christianity</u>. For some, the threat of hell had been used in emotionally abusive and manipulative ways to control their behavior. Then there's the idea of who is in and who is out. Who will "get into heaven" and "who won't?"

Is there another way to think about the word "salvation"? What does the Bible say? The people in ancient Israel did not believe in an afterlife. So, the idea of salvation being about after we die, would not be mentioned in the Old Testament. In the New Testament, *salvation* is occasionally about an afterlife – but most of the time it is not. So also *saved* and *savior* are not primarily about being saved from our sins so that we can go to heaven.

Salvation can also mean being liberated from bondage, or rescued from peril, or deliverance, such as **deliverance from blindness to seeing again, deliverance from infirmity to well-being, deliverance from fear to trust, deliverance from injustice to justice, deliverance from violence to peace.**

On Sundays we have talked about salvation as rescue from fear, from addition, from economic oppression, from racism, etc. We also discussed salvation as change, which Jesus called us to do in Luke 13:3, 5. There are many other ways to think of salvation, such as salvation as trust and confidence, salvation as promise, salvation as acceptance, salvation as pardon. Perhaps you have thought of more ways.

Marcus Borg summarizes all this in one sentence, "Salvation is the twofold transformation of ourselves and the world."

Personally, I like to think of salvation in these ways that are present here and now, as I live; not what happens when I die. However, your thoughts may be different. I respect that. I like to "research" some of these "churchy" words to find options; what makes sense to me and my heart. What will make my faith stronger? What can I anchor my trust in God on?

Something to ponder on your Lenten journey. Peace, Pastor Rosemary
