Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

The lectionary Bible Texts now continue the story of Jesus' appearance to the disciples and his last instructions and inspiration to them to continue what Jesus himself started. Many of our texts move to the Book of Acts as we read how the followers of Jesus answer the commission. Some would say it was the beginning of our Christian church.

However, the first recorded use of the term "christian" (or its cognates in other languages) is in the New Testament, in **Acts 11:26**, after Barnabas brought Saul (Paul) to Antioch where they taught the disciples for about a year, the text says: "the disciples were called Christians first in Antioch."

Yet there is some controversy about that. Scholar Kenneth Samuel Wuest holds that all original New Testament verses' usages reflect a derisive element in the term Christian to refer to followers of Christ who did not acknowledge the emperor of Rome. The city of Antioch, where someone gave them the name Christians, had a reputation for coming up with such nicknames. Interesting. Plus, the fact that the New Testament was first written in Greek and there is no word in Greek that can translate to "christian." The followers of Jesus were simply called "believers" and their "church" was called "the way."

Now it is our turn. As followers of Jesus, how do we nurture and strengthen our belief while answering the call from Jesus to continue his work of teaching, healing, and compassion?

## SLEEPING MATS FOR THE HOMELESS

There is always a need. We were able to make over 200 kits for young women in Peru. This time the need is more local – sleeping mats for the homeless made from plastic shopping bags. We have a lot of plastic bags at church. There are three different jobs that need to be done:

- 1. The bags need to be folded and cut into strips.
- **2.** The strips need to be joined into a continuous piece of plastic for crocheting.
- **3.** The mats need to be crocheted using only a chain stitch and single crochet. You will need a crochet hook, size N, or something close.



Instructions for making the mats can be found on Youtube and many websites.

### Here is a sample pattern:

- 1. Flatten the plastic bag and straighten any of the bags creases. Keep folding bag vertically (from left edge to right edge) until the fold is approx. 1 inch wide.
- 2. Cut off the top handles and the bottom seam. (Put unused scraps in a bag to recycle at grocery store drop-off).

- 3. From top to bottom of folded bag, cut 1 1/2 inch strips across vertically (left to right). Each strip should be a loop when opened up. (If any strip has an opened end, tie a very small knot to make it a loop).
- 4. Hook the loops together with a basic "larks head knot". This is done by overlapping two of the loops end-to-end, then pulling the top of one end through the middle intersection of the two loops. Repeat this step.
- 5. Roll the looped strips into a ball of "plarn".
- 6. Using size N crochet hook, or something close, crochet 60 chain stitches (approx. 3 ft wide). Continue to crochet rows of single crochet stitch until the sleeping mat is approximately 6 feet long and 3 feet wide. 7. Crochet a chain stitch of plarn long enough to attach to one end and tie up the rolled mat. This serves as a carrying handle.

Or maybe Sundays or Saturdays work better for you. We adults could have our own "confirmation" class or maybe Christians Under Construction.

# **What We Believe in the UCC**

We believe in the triune God: Creator, resurrected Christ, the sole Head of the church, and the Holy Spirit, who guides and brings about the creative and redemptive work of God in the world.

We believe that each person is unique and valuable. It is the will of God that every person belong to a family of faith where they have a strong sense of being valued and loved.

We believe that each person is on a spiritual journey and that each of us is at a different stage of that journey.

We believe that the persistent search for God produces an authentic relationship with God, engendering love, strengthening faith, dissolving guilt, and giving life purpose and direction.

We believe that all of the baptized 'belong body and soul to our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.' No matter who – no matter what – no matter where we are on life's journey – notwithstanding race, gender identity or expression, sexual orientation, class or creed – we all belong to God and to one worldwide community of faith. All persons baptized – past, present and future – are connected to each other and to God through the sacrament of baptism. We baptize during worship when the community is present because baptism includes the community's promise of 'love, support and care' for the baptized – and we promise that we won't take it back – no matter where your journey leads you.

We believe that all people of faith are invited to join Christ at Christ's table for the sacrament of Communion. Just as many grains of wheat are gathered to make one loaf of bread and many grapes are gathered to make one cup of wine, we, the many people of God, are made one in the body of Christ, the church. The breaking of bread and the pouring of wine reminds us of the costliness of Christ's sacrifice and the discipleship to which we are all called. In the breaking of bread, we remember and celebrate Christ's presence among us along with a 'cloud of witnesses' – our ancestors, family and friends who have gone before us. It is a great mystery; we claim it by faith.

We believe the UCC is called to be a united and uniting church. "That they may all be one." (John 17:21) "In essentials—unity, in nonessentials—diversity, in all things—charity," These UCC mottos survive because they touch core values deep within us. The UCC has no rigid formulation of doctrine or attachment to creeds or structures. Its overarching creed is love. UCC pastors and teachers are known for their commitment to excellence in theological preparation, interpretation of the scripture and justice advocacy. Even so, love and unity in the midst of our diversity are our greatest assets.

We believe that God calls us to be servants in the service of others and to be good stewards of the earth's resources. 'To believe is to care; to care is to do.'

We believe that the UCC is called to be a prophetic church. As in the tradition of the prophets and apostles, God calls the church to speak truth to power, liberate the oppressed, care for the poor and comfort the afflicted.

We believe in the power of peace, and work for nonviolent solutions to local, national, and international problems.

We are a people of possibility. In the UCC, members, congregations and structures have the breathing room to explore and to hear ... for after all, God is still speaking, ...
